Greetings church family,

I'm right, you're wrong. Now what?

I was on a trip with the high school volleyball team of the school where I was principal when it happened. We were all in a rental house watching a sports movie after a day of tournament games when a song came on.

I grew up in the era the song was first popular and I was singing along with it and then exclaimed, "I love Creedence Clearwater Revival!"

One of the adult sponsors traveling with the team said, "That's not Creedence Clearwater."

"Yes it is."

"No it's not. You're wrong."

"No I'm not. I'll wager the \$10 in my wallet."

As it turns out, it wasn't Creedence Clearwater. Not by a long shot. It was The Hollies who sang "Long Cool Woman." I hate being wrong.

As much as I hate being wrong, I LOVE being right. About anything and everything. This love/hate relationship I struggle with has been heightened and magnified with my participation in social media.

What is a person to do when they see something posted by a friend or church member that is wrong? Especially when it comes to politics, religion or whether people sitting next to me in church should wear a face covering?

This gets more complicated as we look at the political climate in the United States and Canada today. People in red hats are sure they have all the answers to the social, economic, and moral problems our country faces. People who voted for the other guy are 100% sure that the folks in the red hats are 100% wrong about everything that they are 100% right about. And then there's the folks with the BLM bumper stickers. They see a whole slew of historical and systemic injustices that, in their view, need attention now!

Add to that the divide between liberal and conservative amateur theologians in our church that have strong opinions about music, preaching and whether a woman should be allowed to pastor.

To complicate things further, enter the first pandemic this country has gone through in 100 years and the problems listed above come back to us 100-fold.

People are posting, saying, preaching, and shouting all kinds of facts, opinions, and all kinds of "facts!" Masks do work. Masks don't work. Get vaccinated! Vaccinated? That's ridiculous! Take dewormer medicine and be a vegan! God will protect you from the virus if you just have a little faith! I believe Doctor Fauci! What? He and Bill Gates are out to get you!

Youtubes are being passed around like Halloween candy. Churches are hosting "experts" in every field. streaming on computer screens, telling us what to and not to do in regards to mandates, vaccinations, and face coverings.

All of this information has saturated and polarized millions of people.

I recently had a pastor in our denomination (from another conference) tell me that the vaccine I've received is going to transmit information through 5G to Bill Gates and his associates so they can track me and find me and persecute me when the time of trouble comes. This isn't the first person who has shared this information with me.

Assuming I disagreed with what my friend has shared with me, how should I have responded to this? How would you respond to this if it was a fellow church member who shared this with you? What if you saw it on a friend's social media post?

In an age of information-sharing unparalleled in the history of the world, a YouTube video is truth. If you want it to be. A Facebook meme is truth. If you want it to be.

The Bible is clear on how we should respond to people who are speaking/posting wrong things.

Proverbs 26:4 "*Do not answer a fool according to his folly, or you yourself will be just like him.*"

There you go! Right from the pen of the wisest man who ever lived. The best thing to do when you hear somebody say something foolish (wrong) is to just let them speak/write/post. Engaging them in a debate will just drag you down to their level. You are foolish to engage.

But wait, there's more! The very next strokes from the pen of inspiration take a sudden turn!

Proverbs 26:5 "*Answer a fool according to his folly, or he will be wise in his own eyes.*"

So maybe the best thing to do when we see somebody's posts or say something full of error that could mislead other people, is to correct them so that they can know their wrongness and not be wise in their own eyes. Like Jesus, maybe we should say, "Are you so dull?"

So, which is it? It would seem the writer of Proverbs believes that every situation might warrant a varied and measured reaction. Sometimes it's good to remain silent. Sometimes it's better to rebuke and engage in a course correcting discussion.

In this age of slinging information around like everything's a fact, here's how I navigate as to whether I should engage in pointing out error/correcting misinformation. These are rules I've made for myself. I hope they can give you a starting point for how you want to cope with all the chaos.

1) I don't argue with people that I'm not vested in. If I see a Facebook post from somebody that is barely an acquaintance and not a friend or relative, I might post something for them to consider, but I won't argue.

2) I am involved in social media. If I see something posted that is conspiratorial or factually challenged, I sometimes phrase a rebuttal like this, "I know you value good information. Here's another point of view to consider." I follow that by a word of affirmation about my relationship with that person. My hope is that what I have posted will be read along with what was originally posted.

3) If a family member or a close friend that I care deeply about is passing along what I would consider to be misinformation or conspiracy theories, I will challenge them on what they are saying/posting. But I will not do this publicly. I will present evidence privately and hash it out where nobody can see it. In the end, these people are deeply loved by me and whatever their views, they may be in my life until I die.

4) Don't make anything personal. Name calling, insults and mudslinging toward the person who posted/proclaimed what you perceive to be in error, or toward any public official who you may be arguing about, is beneath a person who calls Jesus a friend.

5) I'm a pastor. If someone is passing along conspiracy theories or misinformation in my church, I will put a stop to it pretty quickly. A personal visit and a friendly reminder that we need to keep our eyes on Jesus and off the dark corners of rumors circling the globe is my duty as a shepherd of the flock.

6) Humor. When my pastor friend told me that the inoculations were magnetized so that the government could use 5G to track me, I said, "Boy is some FBI agent going to be bored with my life! They will track me from the church to my home and then back to the church again... over and over and over again!"

They laughed and then got serious and said, "So you think the vaccinations are safe?"

I answered and said, "I have no idea! I just wanted to follow the example of President Trump, President Biden, all the Republican and

Democrat Governors! I figured if they all got it, it must be the thing to do!"

Then I broke out laughing. And he followed.

In the end, the most important thing to me is that I treat everyone with love and respect. Folks typically aren't drawn to Jesus because they lose an argument. Treating humans with love and respect is paramount to my interactions with all people in my sphere of influence. If I can't rebut a post or a comment with love, then I have no business saying anything at all.


THIS WEEKEND

Portland Adventist Elementary School is seeking a pianist to accompany the school choirs. This would include two weekly rehearsals with each of the 5th-8th grade choirs as well as rehearsals with each of the K-4th grade choirs as needed for performances. The PAES Music Department also includes a piano studio. In the past the choir accompanist taught lessons at the school around rehearsal times. The incoming pianist would be welcome to build a studio of PAES students. We would also welcome the pianist to accompany the school while singing during chapels on Fridays. Total time commitment as an accompanist would average 5 hours per week for the 5th-8th grades and up to an additional 5 hours per week for the K-4th grade choirs. As a school with 300+ students, the addition of studio lesson hours would mean the potential for a full-time schedule. The choir accompanist position is paid hourly by PAES at a rate of \$27/hour.
